Treasurer Report—Norm Bregman

Treasurer Responsibility and First Quarter Update

The Treasurer has control of all funds, accounting to the Club periodically and no less than annually. Prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, the Treasurer and President prepare a budget of estimated income and expenditures for the year, which

stands as the limit of expenditures unless ordered by action of the Board. Balances in Restricted Funds in the Rotarian-Foundation of Livermore are not included. Board approval is required for these funds to be spent. The treasurer deposits all Club funds in the Bank,

named by the Board. The fiscal year is 1 July to 30 June.

A review of the 1st quarter of this year compared to last year resulted in a net gain of income around \$13,000. Our month-to-month balance comparison resulted in a net gain of almost \$3,000. Expenses in the 1st quarter of last year were greater by almost \$3,500.

A new accountant, Audrey Horning, was hired at the end of the last fiscal quarter based on the recommendation of our past Treasurer, Glenn Kubiak. There has been a learning

curve for both the accountant/bookkeeper and me. Glenn has been a hard act to follow but things seem to be going in the correct direction and I'm confident I will be able to stay within the budgeted amount for accounting services.

Combining the annual dues with the facility fee has been a huge help in reducing the

Treasurer workload and having to contact individuals that have outstanding invoices.

In the next update I will expand on the Treasurer's duties.

Hosting the "Marylin Avenue Back to School BBQ",


Serving a hot dog dinner

Our club has shrunk over the past several years. About 80% of our club is 60 or older, compared to 42% for the District, and about half of us are 70 or older. Our high average age means that we must recruit new and younger members to remain vibrant.

International Services Committee — Goud Memula

International Services Committee members include Goud Memula as Chair, Pat Coyle, Paul McCandless, Paul Thomson, Keith Beck and Evonne Hopkins.

Projects completed, in progress or being planned are as follows:

Completed the Ear, Nose, Throat (ENT) Mobile Facility in India for which our club raised \$20k.

"Save A Girl Sewing Center" in Tanzania, is in progress. It is being executed by The Global Uplift Projects for which our club contributed \$3765

Exploring development of a project in cooperation with Peace Corps.

Pursuing to expand the **hearing project** to detect hearing loss and treat including surgeries for more children in Nepal. Also reviewing the additional needs to support the Navakiran Children's Home in Nepal.

The following is the summary of the information I received regarding projects executed using District Designated Funds (DDF):

Our club receives ~50% of our contributions to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund after ~2 years as DDF. These DDF are then used for funding District Grants and Global Grants.

In the past 7 years (2015-16 to present) our club received 109,400 DDF and purchased additional 18,000 for a total of 127,400 DDF. These were split into 39,078 for District Grants for local projects and 88,322 for Global Grants.

Local Projects completed, using District Grants, include providing Chrome books to Schools, Dental equipment to Axis, Covid support to local hospital and Girls Garage Free Design and Construction.

Our Global Grant DDF are pooled with other clubs in Rotary District Area 4. Available 88,322 DDF were allocated as follows:

68,802 DDF (78%) allocated for projects in **Nicaragua**, **Belize**, **and Guatemala** 2,500 DDF (2.8%) allocated for Indonesia and Ethiopia, and 17,020 DDF (19.3%) allocated for **Area 4 COVID-19 support**.

There are no DDF funds available to our International Services Committee to support other Global Grant projects from other countries. Details of the projects are available for anyone interested in reviewing further.

Vocational Service calls on us to serve by using our unique skills and expertise to address community needs and help others acquire or refine skills and advance their professional opportunities. Vocational service is the very essence of Rotary and it sets Rotary apart from other service organizations.

BASIS OF VOCATIONAL SERVICES

Rotary has four "Objects" that are philosophical statements of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The vocational service is in Rotary's Second Object:

High ethical standards in business and professions

The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society. The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations

INTEGRITY AND ETHICS

Promoting integrity through ethical behavior is an essential part of what it means to be a Rotarian. Two standards developed by Rotarians — **The Four-Way Test** and the **Rotary Code of Conduct** — provide a road map for ethical behavior in the workplace and other areas of life. Both concepts are imbedded in Vocational services.

ROTARY CLUB OF LIVERMORE'S CURRENT VOCATIONAL SERVICES PROJECTS:

Outstanding Educators Awards, in partnership with LJUSD, presented in the spring Ed Rundstrum Vocational Scholarship- \$2,000 vocational scholarship administered by The Pedrozzi Foundation.

Youth in Government, in partnership with LJUSD and The City of Livermore, presented in the spring.

Rotarians Advancing Veteran Education (RAVE) that supports the Las Positas Veterans First Program is that college's veterans support program. We have chosen to support the veterans at Los Positas and the LPC Veterans First Program with various funding and activities through RAVE. This is an ongoing activity throughout the year.

Accomplishments of our club TRF to date are as follows:

Compiled the profile of Rotarians making TRF donations in the past five years.

20% of Rotarians contributed 70% of Total Donations

47% of Rotarians contributed 25% of Total Donations

33% of Rotarians contributed 5% of Total Donations

We have an opportunity to increase the participation of more Rotarians in making TRF donations.

Established TRF Goals for 2022-23 based on history of donations as follows

Rotarians Alan Burnham, Patrick McMenamin, Irving Stowers, Norm Bregman, Jay Davis, Goud Memula and Don Wentz are gracious to donate their FRP to match all donations of \$100 or more. Collectively there are over 150,000 FRPs available to match donations as well as to use for recognizing outstanding community volunteers with PHF recognition.
