
President Sblend's comments



International Services Committee — Goud Memula

For Rotary year 22-23, our club was allocated **16,566 of District Designated Funds (DDF).** Approximately 50% of our contributions to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund from the last two years and seven months come back to us for use in District and Global Grants.

District Grants—Empowering Women

President Sblend allocated half of this DDF to the Area 4 Global Grant and the other half to a District Grant. He was interested in supporting girls, so we prepared and obtained approval for a District Grant to support Girls Garage, a nonprofit design and construction school for girls and gender-expansive youth ages 9-18. Some of you will recall their presentation to our club some time ago. Our 8,283 of DDF resulted in \$10,353.75 of funding in the approved District Grant.



We are invited to tour the site to see their students building the shade house (Rotarian participation is required for the District Grant). 
International Project Global Grant 3242155 Anubandh (Reported by Goud Memula)

Our TRF fundraising effort is as follows:

Annual Fund \$43,488 vs the goal of \$66,000, which is 66%. PolioPlus \$6,726 vs the goal of \$18,000, which is 37%.

Club has set a goal of reaching 100%EREY, meaning Every Rotarian contributing Every Year and to date we have reached 46%.

We are now at 41% and need help from ALL to reach the goal. We need participation from all Rotarians to meet the goal.

What's UP with Rotarian Foundation of Livermore

The Rotarian Foundation is gearing up to review a substantial number of grant application requests. Per our By-Laws we are allowed to distribute 4% of our corpus as determined by our portfolio as of December 31st. That corpus amount was \$4,407,028 and will allow us to contribute \$176,281 for funding the grants. That is a substantial amount and more than we have been able to fund in the past due to Marty Plone's generous endowment last year from his estate.

The Foundation will also be embarking on funding the Vineyard 2.0 project in Livermore where we allotted \$50,000 to honor Marty Plone's generosity. We will start this funding by placing a deposit for ordering the furnishings for the two Community rooms amounting to approximately \$20,000 either in January or February. Besides the furnishings, the Foundation also committed to purchase the appliances for both laundry facilities. The development will be completed in June or July of this year.

In case you are not familiar with Vineyard 2.0, it is a wonderful addition to our community assisting our low and very low-income residents with a history of homelessness. It is a partnership between the Housing Consortium of East Bay and the City of Livermore to provide 24 units of affordable, accessible housing. The development will be comprised of studios and 1-bedroom units, with one 2bedroom unit dedicated to an on-site manager. The building will also include a 10,000 sq. ft. commercial kitchen, dining room and homeless resource center. The kitchen and dining room will be the new home for Open Heart Kitchen, serving hot meals 5-7 days/week for Livermore's homeless and lowincome neighbors. The Homeless Center will provide the following services: showers, laundry machines, health clinic, mailboxes, mental health services and case management. We are extremely proud to support this much needed development addressing the issues of homelessness in our community.




