Secretary Joel Swanson — March Board Highlights





Kids Against Hunger, Bay Area

Feeding families around the world ... and around the corner

A BIG Thank You to all Rotary Members who participated in the Area 4 Rotary Day of Service at Kids Against Hunger on March 25th at the Quarry Lane location in Pleasanton. Kids

Against Hunger is a non-profit organization that has a mission to feed starving chil-



dren and help end world hunger. The mission is accomplished through the distribution of fortified soy/rice casserole-style meal specifically formulated to meet the nutritional needs of starving children; by engaging volunteers to package the ingredients for the meals; and by maintaining worldwide partnerships with humanitarian organization. Teams of 8 to 10 volunteers packed the bags of high-quality white rice, fortified crushed soy (52% protein), a blend of 6 dehydrated vegetables, and a scoop of 21 vita-



mins & minerals. Each package provides 6 nutritionally complete servings. In the past month and over the weekend, over 270,000 of these packages have been boxed up and are ready to be shipped to Haiti. We had a good time scooping, weighing, filling plastic bags and zipping, all in a pleasant, busy hour and a half. We will have feed a LOT of people. Hooray!

The Livermore Rotary Club in collaboration with the City of Livermore will be preparing and serving lunch to all the volunteers. Estimating that we need about 10 volunteers to prepare, cook, serve, and clean up between 11:00 AM – 1:30 PM. Lunch will be served outdoors in Carnegie Park. (More later)
