Membership — Alan Burnham


There are two major items this month.

International Services Committee

International Services committee consists of Goud Memula (Chair), Pat Coyle, Paul Thompson, Evonne Hopkins, Keith Beck and Paul McCandless.

2023-24 International Projects using 2023-24 Global Grant DDF (Reported by Goud Memula)

Our club has \$13584 (1.25 \times 10867 DDF) for District Grant projects for the local community and \$19562 (1.8 \times 10868 DDF) for Global Grant for International Projects during 2023-24. We will identify worthwhile projects to participate to use these funds. Following are three of these:

International Projects in Nepal and Uganda (Paul Thompson)

The restricted account for Kampala is now being set up in the RFOL.

The Kampala medical clinic project is going well. The local Rotary club is working with the clinic manager to set up banking arrangements and helping in other ways. The Kololo Club of Kampala is really helping beyond my expectations.

I am still awaiting more information from Nepal and the water needs at the Navakiran Children's Home.

District Governor Project "Independence through Hygiene (#EmpoweringGirls)

Geeta Kadambi is schedule to make a presentation to our Club on May 31 to provide an update on this project. Girls who can't afford hygiene products skip school during their cycle. Unable to keep up, they drop out at age 12 or 13. An arranged marriage or sale into the sex trade is a common tragic outcome. As part of Rotary International's #EmpoweringGirls initiative, you can help Rotary District 5170 improve girls' lives. Three Rotary clubs, two in India and one in Africa, with District 5170's help, will provide a local NGO with sewing machines and capital to purchase leftover material from clothing manufacturers and provide training, workspace, and wages for local women. The employed women will sew washable, reusable sanitary pads. The local Rotary clubs will team with area schools to distribute the finished product to schoolgirls.

Other GG projects:

The **Belize Global Grant, solar water pumping**, is funded from prior year DDF purchased with cash from Coyle/Engineers Without Borders and DDF from San Juan Bautista Rotary club.

Our club is planning to host **an international** exchange student for the next school year and needs host families.

Hosting an exchange student is a rewarding way to meet interesting young people and get to know other cultures. The incoming students are 16 to 18 years old, bright, outgoing, and very interesting. They will be attending a Livermore high school. Host families gain fantastic experiences and form lifelong relations with their students.

We will need **3 families**, each to host a student for a three-month period (fall, winter, spring)

We also need at least **one "backup" family** who can take over hosting duties in emergencies.

All host families will be trained to Rotary standards and have constant support from our club and the very active district 5170 Youth Exchange program. All Livermore families are eligible to host, from those with young children to retired

couples. Each family volunteering is unique and gives the student different perspectives of American life.

The Rotary Foundation of Livermore (RFoL) — Mary Ann Rozsa

The Rotary Foundation is embarking on a project, **Vineyard 2.0** in conjunction with the City of Livermore and the Housing Consortium of the East Bay. The project includes developing **24 units of affordable housing** for the very low and extremely low-income households with history of homelessness. The development will be comprised of 18 studio units, five one-bedroom units, and one two-bedroom unit dedicated to an on-site resident manager.

The Board of Directors of the Foundation was searching for a significant community project to honor **Martin Plone** for his generous endowment of **\$2.5 million** to the Foundation. The Board had budgeted \$50,000 to support a worthwhile community endeavor in Marty's hon-



or. This project fit the profile! We stepped forward to support with funds to cover the costs of all the laundry appliances for the two laundry areas (one for the residents use and the other for low-income residents with no access to laundry facilities). Another need was to furnish both community rooms with appropriate furnishings (one for the live-in residents and the other for general use by residents seeking supportive services and enjoying a meal at Open Heart Kitchen). **The Foundation just released a payment of \$22,000 so the appliance order could be placed**. Oher payments will be released as required to fund the remaining items for the Project.

The development will also include a 10,000 square foot commercial space consisting of a commercial kitchen, dining room and Homeless Resource Center. The kitchen and dining room will be operated by **Open Heart Kitchen**, serving hot meals 5-7 day/week for Livermore's homeless and low-income neighbors. The **Homeless Resource Center** will provide the following services: Showers, laundry facilities, health clinic, mailboxes, mental health services and case management. In addition, there will be a clothing closet providing free, gently used clothing, shower facilities, Monday morning breakfasts providing free meals to the neighborhood, **Hope Van** for wellness checks and **City Serve of the Tri-Valley** for outreach and crisis intervention. The Project is scheduled to be completed in September '23.

We are so proud to be able to make this Project a reality for our most needy and vulnerable residents in our Livermore Valley Community

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) Update



For donations to TRF the club gets back \$500 in DDF which equates to:

If used for District Grants locally, it is worth $$500 \times 1.25 = 625 which is 62.5% of Annual Fund Contribution.

If used for Global Grants, it is worth $$500 \times 1.8 = 900 which is 90% of Annual Fund Contribution.


The update of our 2022-23 Goals for TRF as of 5/20/23 are as follows:

PolioPlus: Raised \$16,900 reaching 94% of the goal amount \$18,000. \$1100 TO GO
