The meeting commenced March 31 with roll call of present members and guests. The Tri-Valley Nonprofit Alliance announced a screening of "Uncharitable" at the Bankhead on May 15th.

We voted on and approved the following:

- · Acceptance of last month's minutes
- · Changes to the funding allotted for Music Scholarships
- · Changes to the funding allotted for club Grants (a.k.a. "mini" grants)
- Norm provided a financial update, noting surplus funds, grants, and a discussion on budget allocations.
- Sheila highlighted a surplus in club/mini grants.
- Norm reported record-breaking proceeds from the Crab Feed and plans for changing banks.
- Alan discussed strategies for transitioning members from red to blue badges and improving new member orientation. Joel Swanson
- Loretta detailed plans for Community Service Day.
- IR outlined preparations for the upcoming parade.
- Keith reported progress in youth service initiatives, and
- leff discussed Vocational Service activities.
- Goud provided updates on The Rotary Foundation's achievements and international service projects.
- Irv addressed concerns regarding undefined restricted accounts.
- Kelly emphasized guidelines for the club's public image on social media. The next meeting was scheduled for April 25th.

3rd Quarter April Newsletter Treasurer Report 2024

- 1. As of April 25th, the Club had over \$115 K in our two banks. We maintain an excellent financial position.
- 2. The Board approved \$2,000 increase in Music Scholarships to \$10,050.
- 3. The Board approved mini-grants request for April 2024. The committee's request came in under the yearly budget!
- 4.. Crab Feed income has surpassed \$65,000. My understanding is that this is the highest income achieved. Incredible teamwork to achieve this new level.
- 5. Expenses still missing but I believe it will be under \$31,000 when all is said and done Bregman
 6. We continue to seek a new bank. Gordon Jones has accepted responsibility for contacting all banks in our area, so we get the best deal.

Membership - Alan Burnham



In the past two months, the membership committee has focused on how to make it easier for new members to become fully integrated into the club. One of the products of this discussion is a new on-line spreadsheet for entering and tracking activities for converting a red badge to a blue (to be posted soon). It is hard for others to track how new members are coming along, and some new members in the past have lost their sheets through the process. The hard-copy route is still available, but the long range goal is to have more on-line resources. Another on-line resource to be produced is a video giving step-by-step instructions for setting up the club's database (DACbd or successor) and my.rotary.org.

Concerning our club health, we've continued to decline in membership, with attrition exceeding new members by 20 over the past four years (2018-2020 average of 112 to the current 92). We had a brief recovery in May 2023, but it was followed by multiple people not renewing their membership in July 2023. In the current Rotary year (July 2023-June 2024), we've inducted six new members (including Michelle Kleman on April 10) but recently lost Ron Koopman due to death. Two of the measures we've instituted to make the club more accessible is a reduction of membership fees for next year due to our new agreement with LARPD and holding our meetings on the last Wednesday of the month at dinnertime. That said, with the average age of our club in the low seventies, we have a continuing need to recruit younger members.
