Treasurer's Report — Ron Bregman



As of Dec. 1st, the Club had over \$45 K in our two banks. The CD we have is now worth 51K.

- The Club was approved to receive a **District grant for the Railroad Depot project** using DDF funds and sent us a check for just shy of 17K last week.
- My goal for this quarter is to have all dues collected before the end of Dec. We pay District and International dues the early part of Jan.
- The Finance Committee met in the first week of December. The agenda focused on one issue, creating different levels of major donors and the criteria of benefits they will receive. During the meeting a healthy conversation ensued. The Committee developed three levels of donors: silver, gold and platinum that will be brought to the Board for approval. Stay tuned for more information to come.
- The Crab Feed Committee met to discuss the cost of attending based on the price of Crab. As best as we can tell at this point is that it will be higher and may be more 10% higher. Consensus was that there will be an early price reduction (early bird price) to fill the tables, and a higher price after Feb. 1st. Tickets will go on sale in early Jan. The event will be on Saturday the 22nd of March. My advice is to sign up using Paybee as soon as possible. Paybee is a

Youth Services — Stu Frazier

Youth Services has several updates to report. Here are the latest:

Interact -

The Livermore Interact club sent 5 members to the Fall Leadership Conference on October 6th at Foothill College in Los Altos. There they participated in workshops on leadership, service, team building and more. The club co-presidents will attend a future Rotary meeting to provide an overview of this activity.

In addition, Michelle Kleman and I will have meeting in December with the Area 3 Director of District 5170 along with the Livermore High co-presidents to discuss future projects and activities.

READY -

The READY program has expanded this year to include over 20 students at Junction Ave Middle School, enrolled and coordinated by our outstanding teacher liaison, Lori Valenzuela. These students receive subject-specific tutoring and longer-term mentoring from the Club's READY mentors each week, depending on their specific challenges and needs. Lori has also identified 4-6 additional students who participate in a "drop-in-as-needed" basis when they need occasional help in a specific subject area. While this increase has been a bit challenging to accommodate, the dedicated mentors and students have settled into small affinity groups to work effectively on specific subjects and assignments together, led by our mentors. To more effectively bridge the frequently encountered language gaps, Maggie Tufts, Pedrozzi Young Scholar Program Manager, and Itzayana Reyna, a Pedrozzi Young Scholar at LHS and former Junction Ave student, have joined our team to help tutor the students and to provide translation between English and Spanish when needed. We are seeing some amazing academic progress in our READY students again this year!

Finally, the READY students participated in a fascinating field trip to the Exploratorium in late October and are visiting the California Academy of Sciences on December 7. Many of our students had never visited San Francisco or any type of museum or science center, so these field trips have been incredibly enriching and mind-expanding for our students. READY mentors this year have included Debbie Peck, Carol Lince, Linda Tinney, Bill Nebo, Dennis O'Brien, Bob Cowan, Alan Burnham, Paul McCandless, Maggie Tufts (Pedrozzi Foundation), Itzayana Reyna (Pedrozzi Foundation), Lori Valenzuela (Junction Ave School) and Glenn Kubiak. A heartfelt thanks to this dedicated team!

<u>RYLA</u>-

The RYLA camp is scheduled for June 22nd to June 27th at the Mission Springs Conference Center in Scotts Valley. During our meeting with the Area 3 director we will be discussing the number of attendees they plan to have attend.

For those not familiar with RYLA or Rotary Youth Leadership Award, it is an activity where:

During their week at camp, interactors participate in:

- Leadership curriculum that has been created specifically for RYLA 5170 with the needs of our campers in mind by our leadership directors.
- Camper-Led Workshops where they're able to immediately apply their skills including: Entertainment, RYLA Studios, RYLA Events, Band & Chorus, Speech & Debate, Service Nighttime & Community Building Activities like Yoga, Family time with games, Workshop presentations and more.

And much more! We look forward to sending students to the camp next year!

Summary of 2024-25 TRF Goals and Actuals

Our 2024-25 TRF goals are \$72,000 for Annual Fund and \$22,000 for PolioPlus. We are almost at 50% of the Rotary year ending June 20, 2025.

The Railroad Depot freight room restoration project in Livermore, has been approved as a District Grant (DG) and will be funded by \$16,912.50 from DDF funds. There may also be an additional grant forthcoming from Fremont Bank.

A specific Global Grant (GG) has yet to be chosen for FY24-25. However, a meeting of several International Service Committee members was held on November 14, 2024 to discuss which TRF Type of project might be most desired by club members and in which country it would be most beneficial. The Rotary Foundation allows for funding of GG projects in 7 areas:

> Peace-building and conflict prevention Disease prevention and treatment Water, sanitation, and hygiene Maternal and child health Basic education and literacy Community economic development Supporting the environment

As to which country the Global Grant (GG) should be funded, there was a unanimous recommendation to support a country in which the RCL has previously participated. The recommended partnering countries were:

News from Nepal

My thanks to all of you who contributed to help the victims in the remote village JaJarkot in western Nepal which was almost totally destroyed by an earthquake. We did provide some immediate assistance a few months ago. Our latest endeavour is to help in the construction of a new school. The main construction is to be funded by the Japanese Embassy, while our part will be to provide funding for the furnishing of the toilets. The project is being managed by the Volunteer Corps of Nepal and we have been asked by the Kathmandu Mid Town Rotary Club to assist. We have collected \$10,000 so far. The total cost of our part of the project is \$16,000.

The Kathmandu Club is in the process of writing a Global Grant in conjunction with our club for another TRF Global Grant project in the district suburb of Kathmandu, which suffered terrible damage caused by recent flooding, which also affected many other areas of Nepal. The



management of this project is initiated by the Volunteer Corps of Nepal. Our club will be using other forms of contributions such as DDF's to support the global grant. More about that later.

There is so much need in every corner of the world, and I would like to think that our club, not just me, can develop an attachment to the people of Nepal, since we have been supporting them for more than thirty years through our Nepalese Children's Fund.

If anyone is interested in visiting Nepal to trek or climb or just to have a cultural visit, please contact me. I would love to help.


'Tis the Season to be Thankful!

The Bandstand Story

(The story of the bandstand, as told by Steve Neef)

The bandstand idea came from Downtown Inc's project wish list. They needed a music venu for the farmers' market. The project began in early 2012 with the approval from both Rotary clubs to pursue a bandstand project in Carnegie Park. The bandstand project was planned by both Rotary clubs (noon and morning). The RFL foundation became the project backstop, or sponsor, after we obtained city approval. Steve Neff and Dennis Gambs, coordinated project reviews/approval, material donations, construction by contractors, and rotarian volunteers. Of course, Steve was the projector signer. (I wanted to make sure that I didn't have to look at an ugly structure from my office)

Dennis Gambs, Rotarian in the morning club, was the idea man who came to me because of my ability to draw. As we designed the bandstand the concept of size kept growing to accommodate larger bands. Finally, the decision was made to freeze the building at 20 feet since lumber comes in that length and increase the stage to 28 feet. The height of the stage was determined by what is a good sitting height, so people can sit on the edge of the concrete stage.

The project took about five years to complete. Because the Carnegie building is an historic landmark, the city of Livermore had to undertake a CEQA process (California Environmental Quality Act) which required the preparation of a master plan of Carnegie park. Add to that the design review and collaboration with over 10 community organizations including City Commissions, and the City Council.

Dennis had looked at dozens of bandstands and I interviewed many of the builders to get their input. We put everything he learned into designing this bandstand. We wanted an old-fashioned style to go with the Carnegie building without trying to create false history. We originally thought of an all-wood structure but the city wanted it to be maintenance free so we went to steel columns. JR Romero painted the steel with automotive paint which will last forever. The brick was added around the edge to tie into the carnegie building.


Most of the work was done by volunteer Rotarian labor with the exception of steel fabrication, some professional framing, and the laying of brick. Barnett construction did the concrete work at a greatly discounted price. The thing that I am most proud of was my ability to figure out what we were capable of doing each day and schedule work parties to accomplish that day's tasks, and then know when we had needed professional help.

As part of the project we also upgraded the electrical service to the Carnegie building. This was actually the biggest expense, but now the air conditioning in the building can run without the computers shutting down.

David Bedford and Kathy Coyle worked to raise the money to pay for it and I understand that the club made a profit and in the end we had an extra \$25,000. In the beginning there was some hesitancy by the Rotarian Foundation to sponsor the project and pay for it. RFL never needed to front any money for the project through donations ahead of contractor payments.

(Millie stepped in and told the Foundation that they work for the club, not the other way around, and they were going to pay for it. I understand David Bedford was also very local.) In any case RFL now has policy that make projects like the bandstand easier to sponsor.

My band only played on the bandstand once, but it was a lot of fun.



The Auction D' Elegance

My brother Paul and I were at the San Francisco Airport, with our mother, in the departure lounge, waiting for her to board her plane to England. I was picking up a cup of tea for her when the Loma Prieta Earthquake struck. Our Mum's reaction was "where's my tea?" amid the dust and ceiling tiles falling from 60ft above us. For obvious reasons her plane did not take off that day.

Coming in as Rotary president, in 1989, my plan was to have an Auction D' Elegance in the spring to begin building the corpus of our Rotarian Foundation of Livermore. This plan was changed by Loma Prieta. Ray Gilmore joined me for lunch a few days after the quake and agreed to chair our Auction event, for earthquake relief. Ray organized an incredible event.

Just 30 days later, on a Thursday evening before Thanksgiving 1987, at the Holiday Inn in Livermore, we raised \$31,000. Amrit Duneja, the general manager of the Holiday Inn donated the room and the food, and our members provided auction items. Past presidents all dressed up as elves and were our servers. (Imagine Al Lewis and John Shirley -- it was quite the site). Other elves included Marty Plone, Randy Schlientz, John Saboraria, Barry Schrader, Don Nolte, Dale Turner, Bob Edwards, and Mel Nelson. A fun evening was enjoyed by all. Think about how amazing it was to put together an event, like that, in just 30 days. We had amazing members then, and we still do, which makes Rotary such a wonderful organization.

We continued raising earthquake donations from within our club, and outside the club, for a grand total of \$67,000 (+/-). We gave \$25,000 to The Red Cross, and the rest to the Watsonville Rotary Club.

Footnote: Future Auction D'Elegance events, over the following 10-12 years, raised \$45,000 up to \$85,000 each year. Our Foundation was up and running.
