President Marc Robert's Comments



Fellow Rotarians – Welcome to the Spring Newsletter! The Rotary year is flying by, and we have been busy.

Our project to finish the **freight room** in the historic train station has finally launched! This project will create a space that can be used as a meeting room for non-profits and community groups. We have been working for the last 18 months to get all of the agreements and permits for the project. At the beginning of the calendar year, we received our right of entry from the City which will allow us to control the property to complete the work.

We are partnering with KPA Group Engineers and Architects who have agreed to be the architect and general contractor for the project. They were the architect for the original Depot restoration and relocation project and have agreed to complete our project probono. This winter the architect completed the building plans and we have now received approval of our building permit.

To fund the project, the Club applied our District Designated Funds (DDF) of almost \$17,000. Additionally, Fremont Bank notified us that we received a \$20,000 grant for the project. Together these grants will fund the bulk of the project costs.

We are partnering with the **Livermore Heritage Guild**, and our own **Alan Frank** has been coordinating the overall project. This project will be a great mix of hands-on work (with some professional help) and donations, and will be another project that will leave a lasting contribution to the community. **I look forward to starting construction shortly.** Lots more information to come as we start construction and need volunteers.

We've had some great programs this winter from **Jon Schofield's** presentation on neuroengineering to **David Shefler's** harrowing story about how his mother survived the holocaust. There are more great programs coming up – everything from heatmaps to winemaking to aerial photography!

Spring is our busy time with our **Crab Feed**, the Rotary Rodeo Parade and more. In a few weeks we will be hosting students during our International House Scholars Weekend. There is nothing more Rotarian than making connections with folks from around the world. A special thanks to everyone who has volunteered for one (or more) of our fundraisers, projects, or programs.

We are truly making a difference right here in Livermore and across the world. I look forward to doing more great things in the coming months - and having an unusually good time doing it. *I am proud to be part of this club, and I appreciate all that you do.*

Treasurer's Report — Norm Bregman



As of Feb. 1st, the Club had over \$50K in our two banks. The CD we have is now worth 51K. This includes all Crab Feed table proceeds from the sold out Crab Feed.

I expect we will have an additional \$22K in liabilities from the Crab Feed event, most of that is the cost of Crab and reimbursements related to the Crab Feed. My projection is the Club will end the fiscal year with more than 90K from the Banks and CD.

- Marc has officially been asked and has submitted a 20K grant for Railroad Depot project to Fremont Bank. His efforts have been rewarded as Fremont Bank has approved of this request.
- Our Club currently has 94 members, and Goud has recently sent a check to TRFfor every member's contribution of \$25 that he received at the February Board Meeting.
- Levels of sponsorship: The Board approved four levels of sponsorship: silver, ruby, gold and platinum. To be a Platinum major sponsor requires a 10K level of giving is required. We currently have 2 organizations that have met the criteria (LARPD and Topcon). The Board approved offering corporate membership Rotary website advertisement, 4 premium tickets to attend the Rodeo, 4 seats at the Rodeo Parade that we reserve, a table at the Crab Feed, and recognition by having a sign at the table feed table, as well as a banner at all events and any posters and handouts that we distribute. The Gold major sponsorship level is 5k. There are 2 gold members (Fremont Bank and the Ramakrishna family). Benefits include Rodeo and Crab Feed advertisement, corporate level status in Rotary Club, can direct where the funds go, and 4 premium seats at the Rodeo Parade as well as being on our website. Ruby major sponsorship is 2.5K (Wente, Trex Donovan, Bob Cowan). Benefits are corporate sponsorship, 2 seats at the Crab Feed, 2 seats at the Rotary Parade as well as being on our website. The silver major Sponsorship status is 1K (Barbara Lymberis, Mike Thompson). Rot
- My current project is creating a budget template for Alan Frank and Pat McMenamin. My plan is to work with both to share our combined knowledge and share this information with the Finance Committee before Alan and Pat have it presented to the Board for approval.
- The Board approved that the budget for President's Club discretionary fund be increased by \$4,000. The President has used these funds to support grants (\$500) to non-profit organizations that present at our club meetings. The resources for approving this request are available.
- An update on the funds in the restricted account of the Rotarian Foundation of Livermore held for the Club as of February 1: President's RAVE Club \$7,000 \$6,632; Ready \$615; Rodeo Parade \$100; Music Scholarships \$10,476; Club grants \$6777; Rave \$7,500. Club grants will decrease by another \$3,367 with the next round of Club Grants this year. The goal at the end of the year is to have \$10,000 in the restricted club grants to fund \$10,000 from the Foundation and \$10,000 from the Club. This is an excellent restricted fund to receive a tax credit. Give until it feels good!

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) committee Update

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) update includes 1) Update of TRF Goals and actuals thru March 7,2025 and appeal, 2) TRF recognitions and 3) India Trip report of participation in Rotary activities and other charitable activities.

2024-25 TRF Goals and Actuals thru Mar 7, 2025, and Appeal

We raised \$34,490 (48%) of \$72,000 goal for Annual Fund and raised \$21,340 (97%) of \$22,000 goal for PolioPlus. We also raised \$16.900 for Endowment. Clearly, we have lot of catching up to raise over \$37,000 in next four months. We have an opportunity to become 100% PHF club, which is an achievable goal. In the coming weeks, more information will be provided to each Rotarian identifying ways they can help in achieving our goals for the year

My India Trip Report

- During my trip to India, I participated in Rotary activities as well as our Family Charitable Trust activities. These are summarized below with a few photos.
 - Inauguration of Modular Mini Operating Theater project under GG 2461132 at Vivekananda Health Center.
 - Our club was invited to participate in the inauguration of Mini Operating Theater on January 19, 2025. I participated in the inauguration on behalf of our club.



Total cost of this project was \$32,210 of which the host club, Global Champions, contributed \$14,240 and our club contributed \$12,150 and Los Gatos Rotary club contributed \$5,850. Few pictures above show Mini Operating Theater and post op room.

I participated in the inauguration of a drinking water plant at Aksharavanam, a school primarily for orphans and low-income family children. Tri Valley Rotary Club contributed \$7000 for this water plant. I coordinated this project with the school and the Rotary Club.

- 3. I was invited by Global Champions Rotary Club in Hyderabad to visit Institute of Genetics and Hospitals to see firsthand the operations and meet the medical staff. This institute is dedicated to performing testing and analyze to detect genetic disorders. This institute needs an Advanced Molecular Diagnostic equipment has Sanger Sequencer. They are generating a Glo3bal Grant for this project. I met with Rotarians from Mavericks Rotary club in Hyderabad and discussed the Global Grant 2573626 for Mental wellness of students in high school and junior colleges
- 4. Other Charitable activities done thru our family Charitable Trust in the village.

a) Held an Eye Camp for seniors and provided eyeglasses to 90 people. Ten people were referred to Lions Club Eye hospital for surgeries.






- b) Provided trophies pies and cash prizes to winning teams in county wide competition of a local sport called Kabaddi in the village



Michael Ferrucci and Jim Douglas are still concentrating on fundraising and hoping to bring more professional musical talent to Livermore venues.



International Service — Irv Stowers

The primary purpose of International Service is to develop worthwhile service projects. This includes selecting a Global Grant Project and a District Grant Project to be supported with Club generated District Distributed Funds (DDF) or other DDF acquired through cash contributions.



The RCL currently has 15,000 DDF credits which are worth \$27,000 and there are 2 Global Grant projects under consideration for funding.

I) Proposal to Purchase a Sanger Sequencer Machine. A Sanger Sequencer is a bench top instrument that reads the sequences DNA.

This proposal is for establishing Advanced Molecular Diagnostics Center at the *Institute of Genetics* and Hospital for Genetic Diseases (IGHG), at Osmania University in Hyderabad, India.

The Institute has been providing comprehensive care and support to more than 400 thousand individuals, for over 4 decades. The primary objective is to reduce the mortality due to genetic disorders and this is achieved through multidisciplinary research and diagnostic services, including clinical, cytological, biochemical, and molecular evaluations. The specialized services provided by the institute has significantly improved reproductive and child health services while reducing the burden of genetic diseases.

2) PEP UP Project for Mental Wellness of School and College Students in Age Group of 13-19 Years. This project is being addressed by the RC of Hyderabad Mavericks, Telangana, India. GG 2573626. PEP UP is an acronym standing for:

- P Promote Awareness Increase awareness of mental health issues.
- **E Encourage Healthy Habits** Foster habits that support a healthy mind and body, such as physical activity, balanced nutrition, adequate sleep, and stress management techniques.
- **P Preventive Care** Implement strategies to identify early signs of mental health challenges and provide early interventions before problems escalate.
- **U Uplift Social Connections** Build strong, supportive relationships through referrals and community engagement, build a sense of belonging, and reduce social isolation.
- P Promote Resilience Strengthen coping skills and emotional resilience by encouraging

positive thinking, problem-solving, and adaptability to face life's challenges.

This project aims at promotion, prevention and early intervention with the population that is the most susceptible to mental health conditions.

This project is somewhat like Ambassadors of Compassion in our District. The grant application has been reviewed by District 5170 Grants Committee and is being revised accordingly.

One of the Global Grant projects we sponsored last year along with the RC of Los Gatos has been completed. This project provided modular Mini Operating theater to Charitable Vivekananda Health Center in Hyderabad, India. This project was inaugurated in January 2025 and attended by Goud Memula representing our club. Further details are provided under TRF, The Rotary Foundation section.

How did the railroad depot get there? Nile Runge

The railroad depot was built in 1892, 133 years ago. In those early days of Livermore there were two sets of railroad tracks that went through town, and the depot was built on one of them. In the 1970's Livermore wanted to expand and one of the tracks was in



the way. So, the tracks were removed but leaving the depot orphaned and alone. In the following years the depot had a variety of tenants and none of them worked out well. So, the question was what to do with this old, old depot. The depot was charming, historical, and loved. Jeff Kaskey presentred a plan to move it to the location of the bus depot so it could serve as a transportation hub and be the ACE train station.

The old depot was in sorry repair and needed to be restored. I became interested in what it would look like during its two-year restoration. I figured it could be watched and recorded from a nearby tree across the driveway using a time-lapse camera. I bought and attached it to a high branch on that tree, I set it to record each day of the weekly work schedule, recorded an 8 hour work period. Every other Saturday I brought my ladder to climb the tree and downloaded the memory card replacing it with a substitute card. At home I downloaded the data to my computer and made a video. Two years later the restoration was completed and I removed the camera.

With the recording finished I put all the weeky recordings together in a single one-hour video file. The file recorded the daily reconstruction of the building, including installation of a new roof, stripping the old paint and repainting, and replacing the old windows. Each day the activities of the workers scampering at high replay speed was very exciting to watch. (Later I learned that the speed of the replay could be slowed way down so the activity of the workers at work was slower and fascinating to view.) The video told the whole story.

My memory of Jasper Steele Bill Nebo

When, in 1990, Jasper Steele was president of our club, I was deeply involved in parish work as the Senior Pastor of Livermore's First Presbyterian Church. So the calendar reserved for my Rotary work was always squeezed into the cracks left in my parish schedule. A good deal of my enjoyment of Rotary meetings and Rotary work in those days was the gracious, happy and relational personality of club president, Jasper Steele. Because of the great regard and appreciation I had for Jasper's leading of our club, I found myself always saying yes to anything he asked me to do.

I say this because one day Jasper asked me something totally off the wall. I had arranged a speaker for a week after the day that I sat down to a Wednesday lunch, awaiting the club's half hour of business before announcements. But while I was eating, Jasper came to my table, sat down and in his friendly, happy way said, "Bill, we have a little problem. It seems that for some reason we thought that the man had that you invited to speak on Martin Luther Day was supposed to speak today. Now, we realize that he is actually speaking next week." I said, "Oh, no Jasper, I forgot he is indeed coming <u>next</u> week, not today" So Jasper said, "Ok, Bill, so we were wondering if you could instead get up and say a few words about why we are having this speaker for this week coming up". So, I said ok and asked how long should I speak, expecting the usual 3-5 minutes.

Instead, after a long pause Jasper said. "Well, how about 30 minutes"

I was stunned, and for a moment speechless. And before I could speak, Jasper said, "I know I'm asking a lot, Bill, but if you could just do whatever you can to help this, I would really appreciate it. Say whatever you can and it will be ok." A voice in my brain kept saying "No, No, No". But the plea came from the depths of Jasper Steele and because of all he put into the club and community that I was all so aware of my mouth said instead, "OK." So I frantically scribbled notes through the rest of lunch and announcements and did what Jasper asked.

There is power of persuasion in kindness, generosity, sincerity and affection. And in that moment of silence while Jasper awaited my reply I realized that Jasper had that power and it compelled me to agree to what my rational mind said was a crazy request. I am so grateful to have been in this club when he was president.
